Bancroft Community Airport (BCA) has a new airport manager and he's looking to raise awareness in the community.

"We need to raise awareness. When we spoke with [MP] Mike Bossio and [MPP] Todd Smith they said we have to raise awareness in the community and build a case for the airport," said Pat Murdock. "We need to build a brand and create excitement and prove there's a need."

Murdock said the BCA is looking to expand and become an integral part of the Bancroft community.

"We've got to do something with the town. We've got to create jobs for young people. We think with the airport, airports create jobs," said Murdock. "The most important thing that the airport does and can do is providing a facility for emergency services for our community."

A different option is to develop and expand the airports facilities. The airport has already invested in a better fueling system to speed up the delay of airplanes, especially emergency services aircraft, on the ground. It has also invested in solar panels to help fund the airport. The panels have already paid for themselves, returning both initial investments and interest to the members of the airport who funded them. BCA is mostly run on membership fees and solar power revenues.

Murdock also wants to see the airport runway paved. He said the current gravel laneway can be unattractive to pilots with newer planes.

Algonquin Highlands township will submit an application to the province's Independent Electricity System Operator for a solar feed-in tariff (FIT) project at the Stanhope Airport.

The roof-mounted, 320-kilowatt project would garner the township about \$75,000 a year in revenue.

"We have a better chance on the airport project to select a Tier 3 price reduction," chief administrative officer Angie Bird told councillors.



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Air Cadet Program Lifts Off at Brantford Airport

Local air cadets were flying high during a two-day aviation program at the Brantford Municipal Airport on Tuesday and Wednesday.

About 28 members of the 104 Starfighter Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron aged 12 to 18 had an opportunity to get up close and personal with aircraft and pilots while camping out on the grounds of the airport.

The program was a joint effort of the 104 Starfighter Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron, the Brantford Flying Club, the Canadian Owners and Pilots Association (COPA) and businesses like Brant Aero, Solarship and Gilbert Custom Aircraft that operate at the airport.

Brantford Flight Centre general manager Heather McNally said the collaboration with Brantford's air cadets made a lot of sense.

"In the last two years we have been trying to connect with the 104 Starfighter Squadron in Brantford," McNally said. "They are air cadets, but are they at the airport? Their presence was not here at all. Most air cadet buildings are at the airport."

The flight centre reached out to the local air cadet squadron, making a presentation about the airport and its role in the community.

"We explained to them who we are and that we could support them and inspire them to get to where they need to go," McNally said. "We sent one of our flight instructors (to the Brantford Armoury) to teach the private pilot ground school last fall."

That connection led to the formation of the two-day, one-night summer camp that included a whirlwind of activities from downed pilot and rescue simulations to firefighting, fitting cylinders on engines, wing design, aircraft identification, celestial navigation, GPS navigation, drone demonstrations and airspace rules, along with an aircraft pull.

Niagara's two airports are currently run by airport commissions on behalf of the local towns and cities that fund them.

Marketing 101

Find change in the sof

It was a privilege to be a speaker at the recent AMCO gathering in North Bay. Having worked extensively with AMCO on their website as well as their newsletters, I felt comfortable talking about marketing partnerships.

My goal was to remove some of the unknowns people have about how marketing and communication firms work, and how to find one that you can trust. My presentation was meant to be in the vein of someone giving you tips from the inside. You've seen articles or links like that; perhaps something like "a veteran car sales person tells you how to get the best deal on a car" or "a real estate agent gives you the inside scoop on how to find the best

on how to find the best realtor."

When it comes to finding a marketing or communications provider, I believe it comes down to relationships, and finding the right FIT for you, or your organization. FIT stood for 3 simple bullet points:

"F" - Feel right? Does it feel like the right fit for you?

"I" - Is it clear? Is it clear to you how the marketers work, what they've done in the past, and how they will develop a plan or a solution for you?

"T" - Try and assess. Sooner or later you'll pick a firm, but be sure to measure their success, their efforts and their commitment to you.

And I gave some tips to help you find the right marketing partner, whether you are seeking one-time help for a specific project or a long term agency of record. Here is a quick run-down of the points I covered.

If you're using an RFP (request for proposal) keep it as simple and concise as possible. Be sure to cover all your expectations and benchmarks but don't over complicate it. Some RFPs are so convoluted feel like they are asking for your medical records and how you see an ink-blot test!

Be open to new ideas or different ideas. I used the example of a financial institution that initially only wanted some small stand up desk calendars to give to

existing customers. But as our discussion progressed it morphed into a much bigger opportunity! It became an annual fundraising wall-calendar that engaged clients, brought in new potential clients to submit photos for the honour of being in the calendar, gained sponsorship support from their business clients, became a coveted community take-away piece that carried their brand, got media attention through a well written news release, helped a non-profit entity with the fundraising dollars, and subtly let people know that the financial institution creating the calendar charges no service fee for non-profits.

Don't just look at price, look at the agency. What are their values? Do they believe in professional development? Look at their past work and see if it inspires or captures your attention. Are they able to explain their step-bystep process to tackling jobs--do they even have a process?

How do they promote themselves? This can be a real look at just how creative they can be. Since we're "Sofa Communications," I explained how my business card is designed to turn into a small sofa, with just a few quick folds. It impresses every time.

Are they authentic? Meet the people if you can. If possible, more than once; if they are as enthusiastic or as impressive in the second meeting you are likely getting the real deal.

And remember - in today's connected world, distance often doesn't matter. If you like their work, you can work around distance. I used the example of Sofa having been privileged to design and layout the Alumni Magazine for Mohawk College in Hamilton, while we are located in North Bay. We even arrange photo shoots from afar.

Nault made the announcement on behalf of Amarjeet Sohi, the federal government's Minister of Infrastructure and Communities.

The project will consolidate numerous airport services in the construction of a facility to house the terminal, CBSA, FBO, and security/screening, Nault said in a press release.

The project will also realign the apron and taxiway to comply with Transport Canada regulations, as well as an airport hangar.

Streamlining airport services would ultimately improve visitors' experience, Nault said, and attract more tourists to the area.

"As the tourism industry grows, being able to attract new visitors with an improved airport is an exciting step forward," Nault said.

Operated by WestJet's regional airline, WestJet Encore, the service will increase to three daily flights in May.


WestJet stopped flying out of Sudbury in 2001.



PortsToronto Approves Plan to Upgrade and Enhance Passenger Terminal at Billy Bishop Toronto City Airport

After several months of consultation, PortsToronto, owner and operator of Billy Bishop Toronto City Airport, has approved plans submitted by Nieuport Aviation Infrastructure Partners (Nieuport), owner and operator of the airport's passenger terminal, to undertake upgrades and enhancements to the terminal at the airport. Preliminary plans and renderings have also been presented to key government agencies and stakeholders and can be referenced here.

The plans include increasing the terminal's footprint to accommodate the airport's growth since 2010, when the terminal was built, and to further enhance its world-class passenger experience. Specific improvements include reconfiguring offices and administrative areas to accommodate passenger processing needs in anticipation of a U.S. Customs and Border Protection preclearance facility at the airport as previously announced by Prime Minister Trudeau and President Obama in March 2016. The enhancement project will also add more space in both passenger lounges, thereby enabling more seating and additional amenities such as retail, food and beverage services. Overall, the changes will add approximately 2,500 square metres to the terminal, with the majority of the increase being in the passenger lounges. Nieuport will also add an 11th gate to increase the terminal's operational flexibility and efficiencies during peak travel periods and weather events.

Wind Turbine Appeal Leaves wpd Spinning

The plan for wind turbines in Clearview has been suspended.

In the David and Goliath battle between the small municipality of Clearview and the Government

of Ontario and wpd Canada, subsidiary of an international wind energy company, the little guy won - for now.

The Environmental Review Tribunal (ERT) decision that the appeals were allowed



was delivered by Dirk Vanderbent and Hugh Wilkins just after 6 p.m. Friday when the hearing was adjourned.

The ERT ruled that the plans for turbines in proximity of Collingwood Regional Airport and the surrounding areas was proven to be a detriment both to human safety to planes using the airport and well and an environmental challenge to certain species, specifically the little brown bat.

"It's a great win for the Clearview," said Mayor Chris Vanderkruys.

"It's a great win for the County of Simcoe. It's a great win for the Clearview Aviation Business Park around the Collingwood Airport," Vanderkruys said.

"I think this has strengthened our vision of the industrial project and it will be a boom for the economy of Simcoe County," he added.

Greater Toronto Airways Plans Daily Flights From Toronto to Niagara Region

Why drive around Lake Ontario when you can fly over it?

Greater Toronto Airways has announced plans to operate daily scheduled flights from Toronto's Billy Bishop Airport to the Niagara District Airport in Niagara-on-the-Lake.



The company, which also flies from Toronto to Collingwood and Muskoka, intends to use eight-seater executive-style planes for the flights.

The flight schedule is geared toward commuters with an 8:30 a.m. departure from Niagara District Airport and a return flight from Toronto at 4:30 p.m. The service is set to begin on Sept. 15.

"We can do the flight in about 12 minutes," says Chris Nowrouzi, CEO of Greater Toronto Airways, a private airline that provides flyers charter and sight-seeing services to locations in Canada and the U.S.

"Our goal is to grow from just connecting Toronto and Niagara Falls, to then Toronto and Collingwood, and Niagara Falls and Collingwood. Muskoka after that. Then we want really to focus on the townships that have to drive through the traffic to get to Niagara district or to downtown Toronto," he said.






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From the Desk of the Executive Director
